Dear Friends

The first sight of a snowdrop is a horticultural highlight of this time of year. Their dainty, white flowers are the first sign that the earth is waking from its winter slumber and that soon spring will be on its way. The grounds of Walsingham Abbey are famed for their snowdrops, which form vast carpets of white around the monastic ruins.

Many of our wildflowers have earned colloquial names connecting them with our Christian heritage. Snowdrops are also known as Candlemas Bells, as they flower around Candlemas – or, to give it is proper name, the feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple – on 2nd February. This festival marks the end of greater Christmas season, when the infant Jesus was presented in the Temple forty days after his birth, and his mother was purified.

Just as snowdrops denote the turning of winter to spring, so Candlemas turns us from the wood of the crib to the wood of the cross. Mary and Joseph are bound by Jewish law to make an offering in the Temple, prefiguring the offering of the temple of his body which Jesus will make once and for all. The aged Simeon tells Mary of her child's destiny, warning that 'a sword will pierce [her] soul too'.

But we learn of this sorrow through the lens of him who is, in Simeon's words, 'a light for revelation to the Gentiles.' This feast is known as Candlemas because the Eucharist begins with the blessing of candles, which are processed into church. It is the Mass of Candles! For Christians, the darkness of suffering always leads to the light of resurrection.

This year, Candlemas falls on a Sunday, so these Candlemas ceremonies will take place at the beginning of our 10.30am Sung Eucharist. (Even though the symbolism of the candles is slightly lost during the hours of daylight.) May both our celebration of this feast, and the sight of 'Candlemas Bells' poking through the frost, remind us of the light of Jesus Christ shining in our lives and in the life of the world.

ST VALENTINE (14TH FEBRUARY)



Love it or loathe it, in the month of February there is no escaping the hearts and flowers that have become synonymous with St Valentine's Day. Every year, millions of people exchange cards and flowers declaring their love and affection for one-another. But beneath the heart shaped boxes of chocolates and red roses lies the mysterious figure of Saint Valentine, a man whose story is steeped in love, compassion, sacrifice and faith.

Historical accounts of St Valentine suggest that there may have been more than one Valentine. The name was common in the Roman Empire. How-

ever, the most widely accepted story is that of a third-century Roman priest who defied Emperor Claudius II.

Claudius banned marriages for young men, believing that single men made better soldiers. Valentine moved by compassion, secretly performed weddings for young couples in love. When his actions were discovered, Valentine was arrested.

When Emperor Claudius discovered that Valentine was performing weddings, he sent Valentine to jail. Valentine used his time in jail to continue to reach out to people with the love that he said Jesus Christ gave him for others.

He befriended his jailer, Asterious, who became so impressed with Valentine's wisdom that he asked Valentine to help his daughter, Julia, with her learning. Julia was blind and needed someone to read material for her to learn it. Valentine became friends with Julia through his work with her when she came to visit him in jail.

Emperor Claudius came to like Valentine. He offered to pardon Valentine and set him free if Valentine would renounce his Christian faith and agree to worship the Roman gods. Not only did Valentine refuse to leave his faith, he also encouraged Emperor Claudius to place his trust

in Christ. Valentine's faithful choices cost him his life. Emperor Claudius was so enraged at Valentine's response that he sentenced Valentine to die.

Before he was killed, Valentine wrote a last note to encourage Julia to stay close to Jesus and to thank her for being his friend. He signed the note: "From your Valentine." That note became the most famous miracle attributed to Saint Valentine. It is said that God miraculously cured Julia of her blindness so that she could personally read Valentine's note, rather than just have someone else read it to her. It also inspired people to begin writing their own loving messages to people on Saint Valentine's Feast Day, February 14th, which is celebrated on the same day on which Valentine was martyred.

The story of Saint Valentine is a mixture of history, faith and legend. Though much about his life remains uncertain, his legacy as a symbol of love, sacrifice and devotion continue to inspire.

However you feel about Valentine's Day, this year perhaps we can all take some time to reflect on the spirit of love, sacrifice and compassion that gave rise to this most popular and cherished day.

During the service some members of our Cub Group performed a dramatized reading of the Conversion of Paul from Acts 9 verses I-22, and they also offered our intercessions.


