

Ss Timothy and Titus (26th January)



Timothy and Titus were companions of our parish's patron, St Paul.

We first meet Timothy in Acts 16, when Paul visits Lystra, in present-day Turkey. We learn that he was the child of a mixed marriage, his mother (Eunice) a Jew, and his father Greek.

He was well spoken of by the believers in Lystra and Iconium. Paul wanted Timothy to accompany him;

and he took him and had him circumcised because of the Jews who were in those places, for they all knew that his father was a Greek. As they went from town to town, they delivered to them for observance the decisions that had been reached by the apostles and elders who were in Jerusalem. So the churches were strengthened in the faith and increased in numbers daily. (Acts 16.2-5)

Timothy is mentioned in connection with Paul several times over the next few chapters of Acts. Paul includes Timothy in the introductions to his letters to the Romans, Corinthians, Philippians, Colossians, Thessalonians and Philemon, demonstrating Timothy's importance to his ministry. By tradition he was the first Bishop of Ephesus, and the apocryphal Acts of Timothy record his martyrdom by stones and clubs.

Titus is introduced to us in Paul's second letter to the Corinthians. He is Paul's 'partner and co-worker' in their service, and Paul repeatedly speaks highly of him. In Paul's letter to the Galatians we learn that he was Greek and, unlike Timothy, 'not compelled to be circumcised'.

As well as being referenced in Paul's letters, Timothy and Titus are the recipients of the three letters – I and 2 Timothy, and Titus – which make up what are known as Paul's 'Pastoral Epistles'. Although traditionally thought to have been written by Paul, modern scholars tend to agree that these letters were written in the Pauline tradition sometime after Paul's death. Their style is very different from Paul's other letters. They are 'pastoral' not in the sense that they offer spiritual counsel, but rather

that they are concerned instructions about the ordering of the church's affairs. So, for example, I Timothy contains both directions about who should and shouldn't be a bishop, and how bishops should behave.

In the letters to Timothy, Paul's 'loyal child in the faith', we get some insight into his personality and character, not least that he had a weak constitution! As a consequence, he is patron saint of people with stomach disorders.

Since the revision of the Roman Calendar in 1970, St Timothy and St Titus have been commemorated on 26th January, the day after the Church celebrates the Conversion of St Paul, as an expression of their closeness to the apostle Paul. The collect for the day enjoins believers today to have the same fellowship as they did:

Heavenly Father, who sent your apostle Paul to preach the gospel, and gave him Timothy and Titus to be his companions in faith: grant that our fellowship in the Holy Spirit may bear witness to the name of Jesus.

As well as the proximity of their feast days, there is something more historic and rather closer to home which signifies the intimacy of Timothy and Titus with St Paul. The Lady Chapel in St Paul's Church, to the south of the chancel, was first constructed in 1901 as a memorial to the Revd Arthur Drought. In 1928 both this chapel and the chancel were extended eastwards, as part of the church's centenary celebrations. At this stage, according to Edward Kelly's excellent guide to our church, the chapel was rededicated to St Timothy. (Although Christine Morton thinks it was dedicated to both Timothy and Titus.)

This explains why this chapel has a *red* sanctuary lamp, rather than the blue lamp one would normally associate with Our Lady. The photograph in Edward Kelly's book, presumably dating from the 1980s, also shows a red frontal – now sadly lost – which would also be considered unusual in a Lady Chapel.

Edward Kelly suggests that from as early as the 1930s, this chapel became known as 'the Lady Chapel'. Presumably this was because it was what people were used to calling a side chapel in other churches. It might also indicate a nascent development of Marian devotion even in parishes not considered to be Anglo-Catholic. Or it might simply be

because it was at this stage that someone put a Mothers' Union banner in this chapel, and an association with the Blessed Virgin began. (Limitations of time prevent me from further research in the archives. But if anyone wants to take over the role of Parish Archivist, vacant since Peter Hodge's death in 2020, let me know!) Whatever the reason, I am sure Timothy and Titus, who shared so much with St Paul, wouldn't mind sharing this chapel with Our Lord's own dear Mother, nor she with them.

This year, 26th January falls on a Sunday, which means St Timothy and St Titus are not celebrated. Again, I'm sure they wouldn't mind being usurped by our annual celebration of their father-in-faith's conversion. Their lives remind us that the work of mission is not something we do alone, but must always happen in partnership. Our fellowship as Christians is more than tea and cake. It is an invitation to work together for the proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ, making him known to the ends of the earth.

May Paul, Timothy and Titus spur us on with their prayers, and encourage us by their example, as we seek to follow in their footsteps.
