Dear Friends

Most of us find it hard to share our faith with others. The reasons for this are manifold. Perhaps we worry about what people will think of us. Maybe we're not able to articulate our faith in Jesus in a way which doesn't sound corny, clichéd, or just plain crazy. Or perhaps we are inhibited by a culture which doesn't really discuss religion.

Part of the Church's ministry is to change all that by making people more confident about their faith, giving them the language with which they can share that faith with others, and changing the culture of our society so that it is more receptive to the things of God. But none of those things are easy!

However, the season of Christmas gives us an opportunity. For a few weeks of the year, many of our friends, colleagues, family members and neighbours will be entering into the story of the Saviour's birth. They might sing Christmas carols, go to a school nativity, attend Carols on the Green, or even attend a service in church. Even if they do none of these things, they will not be able to escape the word 'Christ' in 'Christmas'.

I wonder if this might open a door for us to communicate to those around us the true meaning of Christmas; to begin – however gently – conversations about what it means for God to come to earth in the frailty of human form, and how the world is transformed by Emmanuel – God with us.

God's gift to us at Christmas is the gift of himself. Let's give that gift to others.

### LITTLE BIT OF EVERYTHING

For 49 years Eileen Collier, a well loved member of our church, has been organising annual autumn sales to raise funds for local charities. The sales are called 'A Little Bit of Everything' and, as the name suggests, there is always a wide range of donated goods on sale. This year's sale at St Stephen's Church on 19<sup>th</sup> October raised £1865.44 and this will be shared between Noah's Ark for a special computer for terminally ill children, and SANDS, which supports anyone affected by the death of a baby.



Over the years, Eileen must have raised tens of thousands of pounds for various charities.

During the Covid lockdowns, Eileen recorded her life, a life full of many adventures including time spent living in Australia and Africa. Copies of her autobiography can be found on the table at the back of church. If you would like to find out more about Eileen please take a copy.

**SAINT AMBROSE (339 – 397)**

Saint Ambrose was probably the first member of the Roman elite to become a bishop. He was also an accidental bishop, as we shall see. His ministry came about because of the divisions and arguments within Christianity about the nature of Christ. And throughout his ministry he preached and wrote about the Trinitarian nature of God, and helped to ensure that the creed which we say every week continued to be the defining statement of our belief about our living God in three persons:

Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Or, to put it another way, he was influential in avoiding the demotion of Jesus from the Godhead, and this change in understanding would have impaired our understanding of our relationship with Christ and so with God. You might say that he was the right bishop at the right time.

Let's look at St Ambrose's life in a little more detail. Ambrose was born in Trier (in modern Germany), and his father was the Roman Governor General of Gaul (a large area encompassing present-day France, Belgium, Luxembourg, and parts of Switzerland, the Netherlands, Germany, and Northern Italy). His parents were Christians, although Ambrose had not been baptised. He was educated as a member of the elite, practised law, and was then appointed as governor of an area which was centred on Milan. We likely have a good idea what he looked like, because a mosaic portrait of him, dating from the 5<sup>th</sup> century, survives (see above).

In about 374 (when Ambrose was 35) the then bishop of Milan died. That bishop was an Arian, which means that he believed that Jesus was created by God before the creation of the universe in order to create the world. The Arians therefore did not believe that Jesus was fully divine, or fully God, because Jesus was a creation of God.

A dispute between the factions about who should succeed the recently deceased bishop broke out in one of the churches in Milan, and threatened to turn violent. Ambrose, as local governor, attempted to subdue the dispute, and his words commanded first the attention and then the respect of those present. So much so that a child cried out "Ambrose for bishop" and this was soon taken up as a chant by the crowd. This was not something Ambrose was seeking at all. Indeed, he was not even baptised, let alone ordained. This was put right in very short order, and he consented to



to become the next bishop of Milan.

As a bishop he was famous as a preacher, and was a zealous upholder of the Christian faith as it had been defined at the Council of Nicea. The resulting Nicene creed, which became the creed which we recite at the Eucharist every week, put into words our understanding of the Holy Trinity. Many of his sermons were written down and have therefore survived and these, together with his written teaching, fill many volumes. He is also credited with introducing the singing of hymns into the Western Church. So next time a hymn moves us more than words alone can, we can thank God for Saint Ambrose. He was also influential in encouraging monastic life, and in cultivating the remembrance of martyrs.

Ambrose was one of the first and foremost bishops to stand up to the Emperors, and to insist on the rights of the Church and the supreme authority of Christian ethics. No doubt his upbringing helped him with the confidence, and provided him with the rhetorical skill to “face down” the Imperial power. In so doing, Ambrose almost certainly strengthened the independence of Christianity and the Church from the secular powers.

As a result, Christianity has come to include Saint Ambrose as one of the four “Great Doctors” (or great teachers) of the Church, along with Saints Jerome, Augustine of Hippo (who was converted and then baptised by Ambrose) and Gregory the Great – well worth remembering if ever there is a round on Church history in a pub quiz!

Saint Ambrose is remembered in our Church calendar on the 7<sup>th</sup> December, a day which always falls in Advent. So it is fitting that the two hymns attributed to Saint Ambrose which appear in our hymn book are both Advent hymns, and here are three verses of one of them (number 32 in Ancient & Modern), which reflect the centrality of the Trinity in Ambrose’s life, thought and ministry:

Come, thou Redeemer of the earth, and manifest thy virgin-birth:  
let every age adoring fall; such birth befits the God of all.

Thy cradle shall glitter bright, and darkness glow with new-born light,  
no more shall night extinguish day, where love’s bright beams their  
power display.

O Jesu, virgin-born, to thee eternal praise and glory be,  
whom with the Father we adore and Holy Spirit, evermore. Amen

## SOME INFORMATION ABOUT THE TWO CHARITIES WE WILL BE SUPPORTING ON 18<sup>TH</sup> DECEMBER



Although we often think about this charity as 'Crisis at Christmas', **CRISIS** actually works throughout the year to combat homelessness. However, the service this charity provides over the Christmas period is amazing!

The services include:

- ◆ Hot, delicious, nutritious Christmas dinners over nine days,
- ◆ Advice on housing, benefits, finances, employment, legal matters,
- ◆ Healthcare, dental treatment, eye tests (including glasses),
- ◆ Hairdressing and massage treatments,
- ◆ Learning opportunities, internet cafés and IT workshops,
- ◆ The charity works directly with thousands of homeless people throughout every year, providing vital help so that people can rebuild their lives as they are supported out of homelessness for good. It offers one to one support, advice and courses for homeless people in 12 areas across England, Scotland and Wales.



The charity **All People All Places** (APAP) is a small, locally focused homelessness charity working in the London Boroughs of Enfield and Haringey. It was established in 2010 and now runs two services, the Enfield Day Centre at Pymmes Park, and a small night shelter provision focused on supporting rough sleepers in Enfield.

- ◆ APAP's day centre offers housing advice, support and advocacy for rough sleepers and those at risk of homelessness in Enfield and Haringey.
- ◆ The service is open to anyone on a drop-in or referral basis.
- ◆ The centre currently operates Tuesday to Thursday and offers a warm, welcoming space with a simple breakfast and hot drinks. It also provides a hot lunch on Wednesdays.

## NOVEMBER ACTS OF REMEMBRANCE AT ST PAUL'S



At the Commemoration of All Souls Eucharist on 3<sup>rd</sup> November we remembered our loved ones and former members of our church, and then on 10<sup>th</sup> November, Remembrance Sunday, we remembered those from our parish who had died in the two World Wars. This is always a moving occasion as our Scouts place named memorial crosses for those who died.



## CHRISTMAS POST BOX



Our Christmas Post Box will be in Church between 1<sup>st</sup> to 15<sup>th</sup> December for church members to exchange Christmas cards. No delivery service is offered, so please only use it to send cards to regular members of our congregation and please write the recipient's full names on the envelopes. The sorted cards can be collected from the cross aisle. This is a free service but, in lieu of postage, you are invited to leave a donation in the top of the post box for our annual charity, The Children's Society.

The second event for our annual charity, The Children's Society, was both good fun and a fundraising success!

The 'Bangers and Mash' evening took place in the small hall, which had been beautifully decorated for the occasion, on 22nd November. A traditional meal of sausages, mashed potatoes and onion gravy, followed by a choice of bread and butter pudding with custard or trifle (or both) was served and enjoyed by all of the guests.



Sue Jeffreys, accompanied by Hilary Luckcock, provided a lively entertainment of songs from around the world between the two courses, and again after the meal when coffee had been served.

In addition to raising £300 for the Children's Society, this event also provided an opportunity for members of our church family, whose ages spanned eight decades, to enjoy an evening together.



A Parochial Church Council (PCC) is the governing body of a parish church, a bit like a board of trustees. It is a registered charity, comprising elected members, licensed clergy, and the churchwardens. The PCC at St Paul's meets roughly five times a year. There is also a Standing Committee, comprising the Vicar, churchwardens, treasurer and secretary, which meets between PCC meetings.

As part of our efforts to improve communication and foster a church family to which we all feel a sense of belonging, we are now producing a short 'PCC Digest' after every meeting. These are not the full minutes, but give a general overview and/or highlights of discussions and decisions.

The PCC met on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> November 2024, with eighteen members in attendance.

### **Church Hall Project**

An update was given on the Church Hall Working Group's progress on this project, and the next stages. The project is likely to cost £1.5 million, and research into what grants and funds might be available mean that the Working Group forecasts that the PCC would need to fundraise in the region of £400,000 of this.

The PCC discussed whether or not it has the capacity to raise these sorts of funds, and took the view that – excited though they are by the project – it is probably unrealistic in the current climate. The Working Group has been asked to scope for a much less ambitious project to improve the Hall's facilities and energy efficiency.

### **Racial Justice**

The Racial Justice Working Group met in September, and discussed initiatives and ways forward. There is more information about the Diocese's priority to grow more racially just on the diocesan website ([london.anglican.org](http://london.anglican.org)).

### **Safeguarding**

Safeguarding is a standing item on the agenda at PCC meetings. Our Parish Safeguarding Officer had circulated the updated Level 2 Safeguarding Action Plan prior to the meeting, together with a Code of Safer Practice and 'How to deal with a safeguarding disclosure', and

PCC members were reminded of their mandatory safeguarding training.

### **Finance**

The PCC considered the Actual vs Budget report for the current year, and approved the budget for 2025

### **Committees restructure**

A paper detailing the proposed restructure of PCC committees had been circulated and was approved. This will be implemented over the coming months, which will mean that the PCC will have fewer committees (Standing Committee, Events & Fundraising, Welcome & Belonging, Outreach & Justice, and Premises), with a more flexible system of sub-committees, working groups and informal teams.

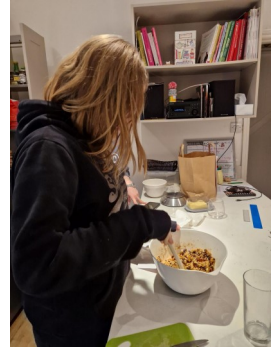
